Over the last 15 years, we have helped students achieve lasting success and strengthened the Hallsville community. Our grants to teachers program has allowed our teachers to explore their own creativity and innovation. We want to make sure we are not resting on yesterday's successes, but always pushing forward to tomorrow's opportunities.

Imagine building a robot at just 8 years of age. Or, being given the chance to be the first in your family to go to college? These are just some of the exceptional opportunities brightening the lives of the many Hallsville students.





In the Spotlight

GIVING STUDENTS A HEAD START ON THEIR CAREERS

In 2010, the Education Foundation implemented Dual Credit Scholarships for Hallsville High School juniors and seniors who longed to begin their college careers early, but desired the assistance of a scholarship. Dual Credit allows students to get a jump-start on their college careers while still enrolled in high school. These courses enable students to obtain both high school and college credit at the same time. Dual Credit Classes offered at Hallsville High School include English, History, Mathematics and Speech among several others, including cosmetology, culinary, and ag mechanics courses from Texas State Technical College. Students must adhere to collegiate standards and rigor and must obtain a passing grade of "C" or higher to obtain college credit. Hallsville High School's collegiate partners are Kilgore College, LeTourneau University, and TSTC and students walk away with a college credit transcript along with high school credit on a Hallsville High School transcript.

Recipients are awarded dual credit scholarships via an application process that begins each spring. The applications are then reviewed by the Education Foundation Scholarship Committee and recipients are notified during the summer. "There's nothing that compares to that light bulb moment when a child realizes they have a chance to go to college. Something like

that changes the way they feel about their life and it changes your life, too," said Beth Godsey. Since fall of 2010, the Education Foundation has awarded 176 scholarships totaling \$48,798. Rachel Kuykendall, one of the dual credit scholarship recipients, believes "The scholarship made a difference in my life for the following reasons. First, it gave me an opportunity to take the class, for without it, I would not have financially been able to afford the classes. Next, it pushed me to achieve high goals in the curriculum itself. I needed the grade to maintain the scholarship. By pushing myself, it has implanted a drive to achieve my goals faster and more efficiently than before. Lastly, the scholarship has taught me to be grateful for the little things that can turn into a big thing. The scholarship alone is a glimpse into my college expenses, but overall, it has given me over 30 hours to walk away with, but at a fraction of the dual credit cost." Rachel plans to pursue a career in the field of allied health.



And the Award Goes To...

Since 2010, the Hallsville Education Foundation honors the Top 10 percent of the graduating senior class. Each honored student selects an educator that made a difference in their lives. The Hallsville ISD Teachers of the Year are also recognized and awarded \$1,000. In addition, the Foundation's generous donors are invited to attend and they are acknowledged. "Being selected as a Distinguished Educator at our Top 10 Percent is one of the highlights of my year. Being a teacher means the world to me, and it is nice to hear from the kids that I have impacted their lives in such a positive manner. I hope

that I am able to continue being a positive influence for my students for many years to come!" said Lee Branson, HHS Biology, AP Biology & UIL instructor.

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Awarded Grants 2016

Have you ever known a teacher who had to take money out of their pocket to do something special for their students in their classroom? The Hallsville Education Foundation assists teachers by awarding Enrichment Grants which makes a difference in the education of our students. The Foundation is a 501(c)3 non-profit, tax exempt organization founded in 2001 to help Hallsville ISD meet needs above and beyond the district's budget. This year, the Foundation awarded \$43,014.86, which impacted 54 teachers and thousands of students. In the last 15 years, the Foundation has awarded \$350,000 in teacher grants to Hallsville ISD.

A Fresh Coat of Paint - \$4,247.84 - All Campuses—Stacey Perkins, Rachel Crider, Emily Dunagan, Beth Green

Our District uses an effective, but dated, curriculum to teach reading and spelling strategies to Dyslexic students in a pull out, small-group setting. The curriculum (Multisensory Teaching Approach) was developed in the 1980s before technology was readily available in classrooms. Much like a 30-year old home, although structurally sound, needs periodic updating with a fresh coat of paint, our dyslexia program needs updating to include technology resources. We would like to bring our MTA curriculum program into the 21st century with the integration of iPads.







LEGO and Let Your Imagination Soar - \$2,410.90—East Elementary—Becky Meitzen & Anna Pratt

LEGO bricks are such simple toys, brightly colored, inviting children to come and play. To children, LEGO bricks are like magnets drawing them in to build, and create. While LEGO bricks provide children with an avenue for play, they also allow children's minds to soar with imagination. Children love being able to explore, construct, and build with LEGO bricks. The WeDo 2.0 sets will enable students to not only play and construct, but also to learn about science, technology, engineering and math in a way that will truly set in motion a love of science through hands-on learning.

*I*³—*I Code, I Connect, I Succeed* - \$3,859.90—North Elementary, East Elementary, & Intermediate—Anda Juban

It is my goal to help the students of HISD go beyond computer literacy by providing 21st century skills necessary for innovation. I plan to initiate this movement through the purchase of programmable robots. At an early age, students will hypothesize, explore, experiment, evaluate, and draw conclusions.











Making Reading Connections With Nexus - \$2,721.30—Junior High—Lisa King, Andrea Taylor, Taylor Miller, Jill Ward, Linda Chaplin, Wendy Edney, Vicki Russell, Lindsey Woods, Carolyn Cole Our grade level ELA team would like to "make reading connections" in our students served under special education, below grade level, at risk, ESL, dyslexia, or struggling with fluency and comprehension by providing sixteen Nexus 7 devices that can be accessed at least 3 days of the week for independent reading as a warm up. Although primarily in the co-teach reading classes, the devices would also be used during writing classes to conduct research for written projects. Appropriate seating for students in a computer lab is almost as important as the computer. My project asks for the money to outfit two computer labs with Flavors Noodle Chairs. The chairs have a flexible back and a raised seat that allows the wiggly, active bodies of 4th and 5th grade students to move naturally without chair legs coming off the floor. The Noodle Chair has a patented suspension which allows the student to move in all directions without tilting the chair! The chair even requires the student to engage core muscles. What could be better-exercise while you are on the computer.







Learning Alive Suite - \$2,591.90—East Elementary—Katie McBride & Blythe Martin The Learning Alive program will enable students to improve their reading and math skills through utilization of a computer equipped with a document camera, software, and cards that spring to life in 3D through the advanced technology of augmented reality.

Do You Hear What I Hear? - \$470.46—East Elementary—Kimberly Hendrix This grant will allow the use of two choir microphones to be used during student performances. The addition of these microphones will allow large group performances to take full advantage of they gymnasium as a performance space.

Innovative Seating for the Individual Mind - \$486.38—Intermediate—Rebecca Rawson Keeping students engaged in lessons and activities is essential to the overall classroom success. The more senses a student can activate in their learning, the higher the attention threshold and retention rate. Alternative seating is one way to keep kids engaged in their lessons by providing a student specific seating arrangement which entices more sensations in each activity. A Projector in My Pocket - \$437.99—Intermediate—Stacey Perkins There are times that all students in our group need to be able to see the content of one iPad simultaneously. Whether I am using an iPad to illustrate part of the lesson, or a student needs to share something he/she has created, the entire group needs a way to see one iPad's content without having to crowd all of our heads around a 9-inch screen. My reading groups comprise up to 5 students, so a small, pocket-size projector would be ideal for mirroring the iPad onto a blank wall or screen.
